4. YISIDA – Lance and Michelle Richardson, State Contract Cybersecurity:

Mr. Richardson introduced themselves and YISIDA to the Council. Their company YISIDA focuses on cybersecurity for critical infrastructure such as the City's water and sewer utilities. The company's origins refer to the oil and gas industry where they were able to identify gaps in cybersecurity for operational technology. Mr. Richardson explained their product as a cloaking technology which focuses on protecting operational technology assets, i.e., SCADA systems. YISIDA has collaborated with the State of Utah Cybersecurity Office to test and validate their technology. A 60- day pilot program was conducted in several Utah cities which was successful and led to the development of a state funded program to assist rural communities. The program aims to provide the technology to rural communities at no cost to those entities as it is supported by the Governor's office and is funded through various state grants. The technology would be installed and managed by the company at no cost to the city.

The hardware is simple to install and configures quickly. It does require initial collaboration with the City's SCADA technical support and does not require significant changes.

Mayor Woolstenhulme asked about the contracting process and the need for a signed contract. **Mr. Richardson** responded that the contract with the State will be in place by July, but installation can start immediately. The annual cost for the software is \$7,200/year but the first year is covered by the State. He stated that there are efforts underway to secure longer-term funding through the state.

Councilmembers discussed the need for critical infrastructure protection but also voiced concern about ongoing costs should state funding not remain available. They also stated that they would like to confer with the City's engineers and IT specialists before moving forward with installation.

Mayor Woolstenhulme stated that he will direct Recorder Rydalch to follow up with the necessary parties and place this item on the consent calendar for approval at the next meeting.

5. CELEBRATION COMMITTEE DISCUSSION – Councilmember Frazier

Councilmember Frazier has updated the proposed Celebration Committee assignments based upon the conversation from the last meeting. Councilmembers reviewed the updated assignment and structure of the committee. He asked Councilmembers to have their volunteer heads by the first of the year.

General discussion regarding assignments and if there are any changes councilmembers would like to make. Councilmembers are to work on their assignments and report back with their representatives for the committee.
