35	2. PUBLIC COMMENT:

39	Ennis Gibbs, Wreaths Across America Kamas Valley Coordinator: "I want to just come and he
40	can sit down and relax, just don't take more than three minutes. I will. Thank you. You know,
41	this is the second year that I've been involved in Race Across America. The first year I got deathly

42 ill and couldn't even participate. But my goal for that year was to cover 50 graves. And what was 43 all said and done, they had 250 graves that were covered that year. This year, our goal was to 44 cover all of the veterans' graves in all of the seven cemeteries in the valley, and that would 45 amount to 500 approximately 500 graves. And we did that. It was an amazing, amazing thing. It was, it was stunning that we were able to get that kind of support. That because we got the 46 47 three major cities involved, the county participated in it, the cemetery board supported it, and 48 there was just fantastic support from all the citizens. And so I'm here to thank you for your 49 support, and also to kind of give a report of just what happened. We did cover the 500 graves, 50 but it's part of a much, much larger effort than that. This year, there were 3 million veterans 51 graves covered with Wreaths Across America. I mean, it's just a stunning number. Is so 52 impressive. And in that there was 4700 cemeteries that were covered, approximately 100 here 53 in Utah, and we had seven of them. I mean, it's just incredible. Anyway, the mission of Wreaths 54 Across America is basically three-fold. First is to honor the veterans that are in the cemetery. 55 Second of all is to recognize veterans that are still alive, that come to the ceremony and 56 recognize their service. And third is to teach young people what they did. And for those of you 57 that were able to come, we did very, very well on mission number three, which was to teach 58 there were a lot of young people there, and they would come up to me and they said, Are there 59 any more reads we can give out? You know, they loved the program, so I just am here to thank 60 you and tell you how, how I would guess that there was about at the cemetery here, Joe, maybe 61 75 to 100 people there, participants in there, probably 10 to 12 veterans that were there, that 62 were recognized By the crowds. So it was tremendously successful. Now the last part of the 63 mission is to figure out, what the heck am I going to do at 500 wreaths or scattered around the 64 valley different cemeteries? And I wonder if maybe there's some room in some of your 65 dumpsters we could throw a few of them. We've got the cemetery district and other people that 66 are willing to let us use a some. But I wonder if you've got any overflow room that I could put

3. PRESENTATION OF THE 2024 FISCAL YEAR AUDIT: Heather Christopherson, Ulrich & Associates:

Ms. Christopherson presented the independent nature of the audit and went through the auditor's report with the Council. She confirmed that there were a few small adjustments but that the Council should have confidence in the financial information the staff is providing them. Audit was completed in December of 2024. She explained the financial statements, including the statement of net position and the statement of activities. She reviewed the balance sheet, modified accrual accounting and the net income statement and changes in fund balance.

83 Ms. Christopherson recommended minor changes including tracking costs for new trials and 84 ensuring arm's length transactions are documented. She suggested creating general ledger 85 accounts under Parks for trail maintenance costs. She also encouraged the City to document 86 the awarding of contracts to avoid perceived favoritism, stating that this is a challenge in small 87 communities. She recommended the City work with a particular vendor with the rodeo. She 88 encouraged the City to continue to make improvements in the preparation and posting of 89 minutes of open meetings.

c. Budget Items - City has been approached by Howard Sorensen to contribute to some items associated with the improvements to the Mountain Bike Park. He is looking for assistance with playground bark, picnic tables, and metal handrailing. The total budget ask is around \$13,500. Councilmember Kimber expressed concern regarding the City investment as this was a project that was proposed to the City as being funded entirely

125 through grant and private donations. Item is to be added to the consent calendar for the 126 second January meeting. 127 d. Well Progress - On target for mid-April substantial completion. Some valves are on 128 back order, but a contingency plan is being considered for these parts. Potentially 129 utilizing valves that are sourced outside the United States until the ordered valves are 130 available and then making the change. Looking to USDA for approval of this 131 contingency. 132 e. Rural Water Recognition - Rural Water has selected the City's Water system as the 133 most improved in the State for 2024. This is attributable to the Council's willingness to 134 make changes to address additional water sources, conservation rate structures, initiate 135 a capital improvement plan, and a willingness to make hard decisions to get the water 136 utility operating more effectively. 137 f. Ranked Choice Voting - Asked the Council if they would be interested in considering 138 Ranked Choice Voting for the upcoming election. It was decided to invite a 139 representative from the Ranked Choice Voting initiative to come speak to the Council. A 140 decision must be made before the end of April. 141 142 6. COUNCILMEMBER REPORTS: 143 a. None. 144 7. STAFF ITEMS: 145 a. Rodeo Items - Reminder to Council to get 2025 Rodeo Ticket forms back to staff. Need 146 to get tickets on hold prior to on sale dates. 147 b. Open Meetings Act Training - reminded Council to complete the Open Meetings Act 148 Training on the State Auditor Website and to then forward the certificate of completion 149 to Amy. 150 c. Ethics Statement – reminder to sign statement and conflict of interest disclosure need to be turned filed with Staff for posting and annual requirements. 151 152 d. Public Works Input from Council – Would like Council's input regarding the crab apple 153 tree in front of City Hall and its proximity to the flagpole. Cut down or trim. Consensus 154 to trim.
