Recorder Rydalch presented the proposed amended budgets for all funds for fiscal year 2025. She discussed actual revenue in the general fund and the potential net loss due to the Franson Lane repair expenditure. She presented the amended budget to reflect the capital fund transfer as directed by Council in the previous City Council meeting. She reviewed the different tax revenues, rental income, and fees charged for various services in the general fund. She reviewed the proposed transfers between the general fund, capital fund, rodeo fund, water and sewer fund.

She then presented the Proposed Fisal Year 2026 budget. The proposed budget was presented with two options to the Council one with a truth in taxation process to keep the property tax rate at 0.001 and an option without the truth in taxation process. She stated that the truth in taxation proposed would raise a small amount of taxes — approximately \$30,000. Mayor Z. Woolstenhulme discussed the advantages of maintaining the tax rate at 0.001 and capturing incremental tax revenue each year rather than not adjusting the rate and having to make large increases in the future.

Recorder Rydalch reviewed the Truth in Taxation process with the Council. She informed them that tentative notice had been given to the County and the State Tax Commission in case Council was favorable.

Discussion amongst Councilmember Wilmoth, Councilmember Smart and Mayor Z.

Woolstenhulme regarding the significant increase in property values in Summit County and
Oakley in the last several years. Concern expressed by both Councilmembers regarding the tax
burden for residents. Recorder Rydalch compared the incremental tax increase at 0.001 to a
cost-of-living increase or keeping up with inflation for the City. Discussion that the decision to
undergo the truth in taxation process needs to be decided at the next meeting in order to meet
the deadline requirements.

Discussion turned to individual budget fiscal year 2026 items. The Council asked Public Works Director Kendell Staples to speak to some of the budgetary requests.

Director Staples requested the Council consider purchasing a VAC trailer for the public works department. He stated that the City used to share ownership with Kamas and Francis but somehow it was disposed of by a former Oakley City employee. Mayor Z. Woolstenhulme mentioned that the County has this type of equipment and might allow the City to utilize it when needed. Director Staples indicated that it required a CDL to operate and that currently Oakley City Public Works employees do not have the necessary licensing. Discussion about looking into buying used, utilizing County operators when necessary, or waiting on the purchase. Ultimately it was decided that it didn't need to be appropriated at this time but if necessary, Director Staples could appeal to Council at a later date and unassigned fund balance could be used.
